Year 1/2



EYFS and KS1 Author Focus- Martha Mumford




Everyone knows the

Martha Mumford is a popular children's author who has loved books ever since she was a little girl. Her mum was a librarian which meant she always had plenty to read as a child!

In "We're going on an Elf Chase", four bunnies set off on a jolly Christmas lift-the-flap adventure to find ten little elves hidden under the flaps. You'll have to run, run, run if you're going to catch them all! And there are lots of obstacles along the way, from clippy-cloppy reindeer to roaring polar bears and flippy-flappy penguins.

There are lots of other beautifully illustrated children's books by Martha and they are often written with a particular season or event in mind.




Look who stopped by to say hello (virtually!)

An Interview with Sam Simkin!

Sam is a former pupil who has gone on to achieve the most-amazing things! This month, his debut children's book has been released on Amazon and he stopped by to tell us all about it...

<u>Have you always enjoyed writing?</u> Ever since I was in Primary School, it was my favourite thing to do. When sitting in a classroom, creating stories in my blue Literacy notebook was when I was at my happiest.

Who are your favourite children's authors? Roald Dahl was a massive influence in my life. The darkness at the heart of his stories, mixed with really smart humour made me re-read his books multiple times. I have amazing memories of reading The Twits, George's Marvellous Medicine and Esio Trot. The other author who made a HUGE impact on me was Ali Sparkes with her book 'Frozen in Time'. It's a brilliant kids adventure story, but it felt so grown up for a 9 year old! I think I finished that book in about 3 days!

When you're not writing stories, what else do you enjoy doing? Alongside my writing, I also work as an actor and director for theatre. All of which I fell in love with doing at Primary School!

What do you remember about reading and writing from when you were at Gnosall St Lawrence? I remember the books that we would read together as a class. Miss Oldfield reading Inkheart and Charlie Bone on gloomy autumn days was quite magical! Falling in love with stories is my main takeaway from St Lawrence. Whether that's reading them, writing them, performing them. It really did shape the life I live!

Without giving too much away, can you tell us a little more about your new book? Reginald Relish & The Story Machine is a funny, exciting and mysterious story. It tells the story of Reginald Relish discovering an impossible house in the woods, and the impossible man who lives there, Professor Plunket. He has invented a machine that would scan your brain and write you the perfect story... but



it doesn't go exactly to plan when Reginald uses it. There is action packed adventure, scary bits, and LOADS of twists that you won't see coming! It was written in the lockdown of 2020, when I decided to fill the time with writing the book that I would have wanted to read as a kid. Although never named, readers might recognise the village, as many ideas came when out walking in lockdown! It is the perfect book for those dark, mysterious, January months, and the first of seven in the Reginald Relish series. Reginald Relish is available NOW, only on Amazon.
